The first volume [see NTA 53, p. 602] in this two-volume project looked at four key NT texts that together represent a theological foundation for the authors' goal of bringing an integrated Christian perspective to the work of justice and peace building. This volume first analyzes the contemporary terrain of restorative justice and peacemaking in North America. Then it profiles the exemplary work of nine practitioners who are incarnating the scriptural view in real life contexts of profound violence and injustice. The authors work for Bartimaeus Ministries in California.

After preliminary chapters about questions and answers regarding God and about the question of knowledge of God, Erlemann, professor of NT and history of the early church, discusses the understanding of God in the NT with reference to his Son, his Spirit, the world, evil, humankind, history, Israel, his law, righteousness, judgment, and his kingdom, respectively. He concludes that the God of the Bible can be experienced in very different ways, but in the end he is a sovereign God with a passionate concern for humankind.
